THE QUESTION OF DENMARK AND THE DUTCH.

(From the Times.)

There is, we trust, good reason to hope that the expectations here have been held out in an amicable termination of the differences between Denmark and the German Confederation will speedily be realized. A circumstance has just occurred, with reference to the succession to the Duchy of Schleswig, which may materially influence the origin of the dispute. It will be remembered that the origin of the quarrel with reference to the Duchies was in great measure, the determination of the Danish Government under the late King to enforce the female order of succession in Schleswig as well as Denmark in default of direct male heirs, whilst Holstein follows the collateral male line. The representative of this collateral male line is Prince Frederic of Hesse, son of the Princess Charlotte of Denmark, who married the late King. William of Hesse Cassel; the representative of the collateral male line is the Duke of Augustenburg, now in arms against the King of Denmark. This Prince of Hesse is, therefore (more Lord Brougham), a German in right of his father and a Dane in right of his mother, and might claim a Russian right of his marriage. He has been called upon by the Hessians to accept his option between these plural nationalities, and within the last few days it is understood that he has here in London decided to remain Hessian, and renounced his position in the Danish army, and is prepared to resign his rights to the Danish succession altogether. It is a curious feature in this complicated question that the Danish candidates for the ceded succession is to partition and decent a German; whilst the German candidate, the Duke of Augustenburg, is in reality a Dane of the younger Royal branch. If this renunciation can be obtained, the difficulty of the succession is very much simplified. The next claims are extremely remote, and in order to preserve the integrity of Denmark as they now stand it would be desirable for the present King to adopt the acknowledged heir of the contested portion at his own heir, in the event of his dying childless. The Duke of Augustenburg has a son, now about 10 years of age, who fulfils all these conditions, and in his person the rights of the dynasty might be reunited, and the force of the monarchy remain unimpaird. By some such arrangement there branches of the Royal family might be settled. We wish that the quarrel between the two races and the different provinces of the Danish dominions were as easily terminated. Of course, in whatever arrangement is proposed, the immediate withdrawal of German troops and the recognition of all the sovereign rights of the present King of Denmark as the rights of the present King of Denmark is an essential preliminary, in return for which it might be consented on the part of the inhabitants, to allow the German portions of the former Duchy to be included with Holstein in the German Confederation. But this is a point on which the German Confederation has in persistence of its own acts and declarations, no right whatever to insist. Such a measure must be determined on by the King of Denmark and his subjects alone, when the forces have been withdrawn. It is certainly a circumstance worthy of note in these transactions, that the town of Schleswig, which was occupied the other day by the Prussian army after a sanguinary conflict, has during this occupation named the estimable Prussian Minister at the court of London to be its representative in the German parliament, to which no part of Schleswig has at present any right to send a deputy at all. It certainly is a novelty in Parliamentary history for a borough to conduct its election whilst it is in the hands of a hostile army, and to choose for its delegate one of the most eminent statesmen of the country, to which that army belongs.

The very determination in which some of the German writers and orators have largely indulged as to the deposition of the reigning Prince and the total separation of Schleswig and Holstein from the Danish monarchy will turn out to be purely chimerical. No such conquest can be attempted without plunging Europe into a serious struggle; and the experience of the last week has probably convinced the mercantile and industrial classes of Northern Germany that these ambitious designs may be prosecuted at no trifling cost. As far as the arrangement of the succession is concerned, that which is now proposed might have been attained equally well by the renunciation of Prince Frederic of Hesse, without a war; the war has only aggravated the bad feeling on both sides; it has decided nothing, and served only as a vent to the excitement of the German nation, purchased by the destruction of their own trade and the ruin of their offensive neighbours.
