





Among the petitions to the National Assembly Thursday, was one from the bishop and clergy of the diocese of Lyons, praying that catholic priests might have a stipend from the state to the same amount as granted to the protestant clergy in France.

Spain.—The Queen has granted the application of her cousin, the Infante Isabella, to disinherit her mother. She has ordered her uncle, the Infante Don Carlos, to travel abroad with his daughter.

France.—The blockade of Mantua proceeds. The advance of the Austrians and the necessity of starting Verona from a threatened attack have stopped it. The California revolt is at an end. The King of Naples has formally recognised the French Republic.

The Pope has returned a gracious reply to the address of the Chamber of Council of Deputies of Rome. His Holiness, hinting at the impolicy of any needless allusion to the contest in Italy, and expressing his confidence, "with all his soul," to persevere in its situation to matters purely domestic.

Austrian Invasion.—The Austrians entered Ferrara on the 14th of July, to the number of 5,000. They occupied the principal posts of the town, and denied a vote contribution to the inhabitants. The Pope protested against the occupation, and the Chamber of Deputies unanimously voted the project of a league of all the states of Italy against Austria.

Scandinavia.—The accounts from Copenhagen to the 16th inst. state that a steamer had arrived from Calking, informing the Government that the armistice had not been concluded; upon which a corps of 3,000 men, that was being organized and in readiness, received orders to hold itself prepared to embark for the scene of operation.

A Copenhagen letter says.—"We are satisfied that our army will probably be engaged, and hope to have the assistance of England and Sweden, and we have consented to abide by the armistice proposed by those countries."

Hungary.—The Russian Ambassador at Innsbruck has been asked by our Ministry (says a Hungarian journal) for what purpose the Russian troops are now concentrating on the banks of the Danube. His answer is rather threatening. He professes that the Russian Government wishes to remain on good terms with Hungary, as long as the latter country makes no warlike preparations against the Russian dominions; thus designating the Danubian Principalities. The Turkish Government, encouraged by the French Ambassador, and cautioned by Sir Stratford Canning, have sent troops into Wallachia.

The West India Mail is in, and the following is its cargo.

The Courage, with John Mitchel on board, arrived at Benaula on the 20th of June.

The shock of an earthquake has been felt at St. Thomas, but caused no injury.

The health of the West India Islands was in general good, and the weather reasonable.

IRELAND—THE CRISIS.

The Dublin correspondent of the Times, writing yesterday, says:—"So far the utmost tranquillity prevails; but in this country a lull is always open to speculation, and people as certainly prepare for a rupture to the calm as mariners would for the approaching storm. Silence is the most dangerous element of Irish agitation."

All the weapons in the gunsmiths' shops had been bought up within the last few days. The "Practical" agents of the Government of arms has been followed by rigorous measures to seize them, either as imported at the Custom House, or in the hands of individuals, by the police, of whom an additional force of 200 entered Dublin on Saturday.

The 12th Lancers escorted into the city four pieces of cannon and a mortar from Ballinacree; the excitement of the people at this sight was very great.

Abstract of the News of the New Law.—An article on Saturday from Dublin says:—"The announcement of Lord John Russell's intention to support this day to Parliament for additional powers to crush insurrection in Ireland, reached here by electric telegraph early in the forenoon, and had a thunderbolt fallen upon the city it could not have created greater dismay or terror."

The Nation has an article, signed by Gavan Duffy, distinctly stating that he is the monarch, who will rule and will the people to destroy the power of England. He begins confidently with a bold declaration to treason, but concludes doubtfully to the people in the following words:—"For myself I will say, that if the people are robbed of their arms, if the clubs are broken up, if all the organisation and discipline won with such toil are flung away in an hour, if the spirit of the country, so miraculously evoked, be again permitted to die, while the leaders of the people look on in dumb submission; if these things can happen after the terrible lessons we have before us, written in the blood and tears of the nation, I for one will not curse the packed jury that sends me far from such a spectacle."

Main of the Felon says:—"My advice is, shortly, that you stand to your arms, Stand to your arms! Oh! as you have the spirit of meo to revolt against our country's shame and slavery—the hearts of men, to feel for our people's misery—do you love justice and hate oppression—do you love and fear the God of whose righteous decrees British rule in Ireland is a dire violation—stand firm, and yield not an inch of ground to the threat and the rage of our alarmed tyrants. Let them menace you with the bulks or the gibbet for daring to speak or write your love to Ireland. Let them threaten to mow you down with grape shot, as they have massacred your kindred with famine and plague. Spurn their brutal Acts of Parliament—smother upon their lying proclamations—smother them out in the work you undertake in to overthrow and utterly destroy English dominion in Ireland. That work must be done. It must be done at any risk, at any cost, at any sacrifice."

Mr. Lator has less bombast and more reason, he says:—"In the case of Ireland, now, there is but one fact to deal with, and one question to be considered. The fact is this—that there are a present in occupation of our country some 40,000 armed men in the ivory and service of England; and the question is—how best and soonest to kill and capture those 40,000 men."

TO THE PEOPLE OF WATERFORD.

Fellow citizens.—The English Government has just issued a proclamation, declaring you disqualified to hear arms, declaring, therefore, that you have forfeited the first privileges of free citizens. "This is another act of despotism—threatening the liberties of the country—testing the patience and the heroism of the people."

"It is done to surprise—to alarm—to intimidate. It shall not do so. It has come too late. You know your duties well, and you will have the virtue to fulfil them."

"In Limerick, in Carrick, in Tipperary, the Arms Act has been in force for many months, and in those districts it has neither dismayed the spirit nor checked the organization of the people."

"Initiate the example of these gallant men. Be firm—be steady. Organize calmly, speedily, fearlessly."

"The men in whom you now confide, and to whose ability and courage you look for guidance and success, will not fail to give you that advice which the perils of the day demand."

"I am, fellow citizens, your faithful and devoted friend."

"God save the People!"

A letter, dated Saturday, half past three, states:—"It is said that Mr. Smith O'Brien has taken wing and retreated to Wexford."

A letter from Carrick-on-Suir states that "Lord John Russell was burnt in effigy at Ardeeghy, two miles from here, on Monday evening last. In addition to the military, a large police force was concentrating on Carrick-on-Suir, composed of dragoons from the different regiments which have been organized, I hear from excellent authority that in Dublin the number of armed members does not exceed 3,000. They consist principally of artisans and mechanics, and all of them can read and write."

The Council has issued instructions to the clubs to be ready on the first week of August to march 18,000 strong on Dublin. These are their instructions, but it is not necessary to remind you that the plans of the Chartists for the 10th of April, magnificently disproportionate as they were to the result, are not believed by the well informed to be more so than those of the Irish leaders.

The Archaeological Institute meets at Lincoln tomorrow.

M. Gayard of Paris has completed a medal of the late archbishop.

THE MEDAL FOR THE ARMY.—The medal, upon which Mr. Wyon has been for some time engaged, commemorative of the services of the army from the year 1793 to 1814, has on the obverse one of those tasteful resemblances of majesty which that artist always succeeds in obtaining: while on the reverse the Queen, in graceful and dignified aspect, is crowning with laurel the British army personified in a kneeling figure of the Duke of Wellington—with the inscription, "To the British Army 1793 to 1814." The combination of the two figures is very successful, and the drapery is well cast. The relief, which is low, contributes to give much refinement; and the general execution is successful.

SEABER LAUNDRY.—On Monday last a small Steamer was launched from the building yard of Messrs. Treadwell and Co. On this interesting occasion there were present H. E. the Naval Commander-in-chief Sir F. Collier, C. B. the Hon'ble Mr. Church, &c. &c. At half past one o'clock the signal was given, and, ere the child of the Sea glided into its element, Miss Church the daughter of our worthy Resident Councilor, named the vessel the Rover (Queen).

The Rover is intended to be employed by the Hon'ble Captain Keppel, of H. M. S. Meander, in the suppression of piracy up the rivers of Borneo. —Ibid.

Stoke Park.—The splendid mansion and park at Stoke, near Slough, which descended to a descendant of the celebrated William Penn, has just been purchased, by private contract, by Mr. Grenville Penn, for 60,000l. by the Right Hon. Henry Labouchere, the President of the Board of Trade. It was, a short time since, expected it would be purchased for the Duchess of Kent by Royal Highness, the present residence, Prince Albert, and other members of the Royal family having inspected the mansion and extensive park, for the purpose. The Duchess, however, has no intention, at present, of removing from Frogmore-house, near Windsor.

The Buckingham Flats.—The sale of the beautiful service of one of His Grace the Duke of Buckingham, was proceeded with by Messrs. Christie and Manson, the auctioneers of King-street. St. James's the room being crowded by the nobility and gentry. There were 48 lots, of which the most valuable was a piece of plate being of the most magnificent description. A candelabrum, with the arms of the family, standards, and heraldic supporters upon a base, surmounted by a palm tree, from which spring plumes, and a shield (presented to the duke by the officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates of the 6th Buffs (West's) Cavalry), and weighing 100 lbs. and valued at 1000l. The cellar of wine, sold on Tuesday last and Wednesday, fetched remarkably high prices, champagne selling from 15s to 80s per dozen.

It was known that a package of plywood of Norwegian produce, and no previous arrival of the kind having taken place from that northern country of Europe, and the importation is of interest.

We have again to report a steady demand during the past month at prices for Congous generally having ruled higher, and transactions would have been on a more extended scale, had not some of the Importers withdrawn their Teas from the Market whilst others held for higher rates.

We hope to see some revival of our export trade, now that a cessation of hostilities is expected in some parts of the Continent; this would afford Green Tea, especially Tientsin, Twankay, and other teas, a market. We have in our possession a statement of the Export of Tea from China to the Continent of Europe to the 20th April last, and which, we may presume, will not be increased up to the 30th June, the close of the China season, which will then show a decrease of upwards of 50 per cent in last season's export.

There has been a fair demand for Common Congous, which have advanced 1s per lb. the blackish leaf and medium kinds may be quoted at an advance, and the finest quality continue to command extreme prices. In Souchong and Flowery

BOMBAY.

THE BOMBAY MARKET.

Friday afternoon, 5 o'clock, 15th August, 1848

The opening of our season is now close at hand, and judging from the activity that has prevailed in our Import Market during the past few days, we are inclined to look for a good demand for manufactures generally throughout the year. There seem disposed to purchase largely, and we are changes not so miserably low, we should doubtless have had a still larger list of sales reported. From Calcutta advices to the 8th instant have been received, and we are glad to see that, owing to favourable accounts from the northward, a considerable impetus had been given to business, and the Import Market was in a very active state, especially Metals, Woollens, and Cottons. Our Money Market is easy, and in consequence the share of all our Banks have improved in value during the past week; this is also the case with regard to some of the Government securities. Bullion has advanced somewhat in value, owing to the large purchases by the Bank, and other parties, for the purpose of remitting to England. Specie Silver was bought in the early part of the week, at Rs. 1044 per 100 tolas, and is now worth Rs. 1044 3/4 per 100 tolas, has been bought at Rs. 17 3/4 annas per tola.

EXPORTS.

Cotton Wool.—Our market has been exceedingly dull during the past week, the purchases having been quite trifling. Holders are now anxious to realise their stocks, and an almost daily decline may, we think, be looked for. The business done during the week amounts only to 900 bales Broach and Dholler, at rupees 41 to rupees 41 1/2 per bale.

Opium.—The excitement lately prevailing with regard to this drug has abated, and has been succeeded by dullness, while our quotations (Rs. 1,500) show a decline of Rs. 100 per chest. From advices received by express, we learn that the 10th sale took place at Calcutta on the 9th instant, when the result was as follows:—

PREMIERS.—Rates to Liverpool shall be little during the early part of the season, and a decline of 1s per cwt. is trifling, extent at 22 1/2 per ton per cwt. Decline has however again taken place, and we quote 22 1/2, as the rate of the day. For China the rate is Rs. 64 to Rs. 64 per cwt.

EXCHANGES.—Attention having been turned to remittances in specie, of which a considerably quantity has been purchased, holders of bills are selling somewhat more freely. The Bank is drawing at 150d per rupee for 6 months' sight paper; Russell's draft upon Baring's we quote at 15 1/4 to 15 1/4; and in first class local paper at 6 months' sight we hear of transactions at 15 1/4.

SINGAPORE.

WEEKLY MARKET REPORT.

The past week has not been marked by an improvement in the state of our market, which continues in a dull and languid state. The Bagis traders, expected at this season, have not begun to make their appearance, and until their arrival no improvement can be looked for.

Opium.—We have little change to report in the state of the demand for the drug; the late news of the downward rates in China will operate unfavourably. Patna, Turkey, and Malwa are nominal; Borneo has sold at prices below quotations. (Quotation 55 1/2 to 55 1/2)

Tea.—A purchase reported for the Bombay market, of Straits quality at 1 1/2 per picul.

Souchong Wood.—Importations per Sank from Swan River; the market is dull.

Sapan Wood.—Recent arrivals from Manila and Biam.

Sugar.—Some purchases have been made for the Bombay market, consisting of Biam 1st and 2nd quality at 1 1/2 and 1 1/4 per cwt. at 1 1/2 per cwt. Importations from Biam are daily expected.

Irish Emigration.—The Standard Herald says:—"On Friday, upwards of 200 of the most pliantly were landed on Penarth beach from the ship Portia of Lark, from Cork, consisting of 100 men, women, and children, forming an almost indescribable mass of impudence, leazury, and wretchedness, especially Irish in every feature."
